

PULBOROUGH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

CHRISTMAS 2004

The most important message for this edition of the Newsletter is to wish you all a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

We have appointed a new contractor to erect and dismantle the Christmas lights in Lower Street and Station Road this year. This year's display will be fairly modest but the contractor, R Poole Electrical, has decorated Steyning for the past few years so we hope to borrow some ideas for additional decorations next year. We have also arranged a maintenance contract this year so that any missing lamps can be replaced.

One of the Newsletter's successes has been some most welcome additional help for the WRVS meals on wheels service. In this edition we are asking for your help in planning for floods and other emergencies, maintaining Pocket Park and taking better care of our footpaths.

Reviewing the Summer edition of the Newsletter, I thought that you might appreciate a progress report on some of the matters mentioned last time:

- The skateboard ramp is now fully operational - weather permitting – and we have received offers of financial help to purchase perhaps four pieces of additional equipment from Pulborough Millennium Society and Pulborough Sports & Social Club. We have also applied for grants from Horsham District Council and from the Lottery Fund.
- Following the publication of our Housing Needs Survey, we were very pleased to attend the official opening of the new social housing development at **Strawberry Field** in Spinney North at the beginning of November.
- **Pulborough's Fun Day** was a great success. Congratulations to the winning team The Ten Commandments, from Pulborough Football Club and commiserations to the Wooden Spoon winners The A Team. The event was a financial success with a profit, which will be put towards next year's programme. The aim for the coming year is to raise funds in order that next summer it will be possible to put on a bigger event, having learnt from the experience gained this year. With this in mind it is hoped that all fund raising activities will be well supported.

Finally, do let us have your views on any issues of interest and/or concern within Pulborough. For example, there have recently been a number of articles in the local papers about possible charges for the main car park. We have opposed these, but what do you think? We are considering purchasing netball posts for the multi sports facility on the recreation ground. Do let us know if you would be interested.

NATURE AND NURTURE

POCKET PARK - VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

Do you want to protect and improve our open spaces in Pulborough? Do you know Pocket Park? It is a small area of woodland between New Place Road (behind Harwoods Garage) and the main recreation ground. The Parish Council owns the part to the east of the public footpath and leases a fairly large area to the west of the footpath from Harwoods. The rest of the Park is owned by Harwoods.

The Parish Council is responsible for the maintenance of its land and funds essential work including tree surgery and the repair of the bridge. We have recently contracted some expensive work on drainage, which will be undertaken once the surrounding ground dries out.

In the years after the hurricane in 1987 a very willing group of volunteers formed the Pocket Park Association under the enthusiastic leadership of Eileen Kelly and Dave Morris, and did an enormous amount of work to enhance the attractions of this delightful part of Pulborough. Unfortunately, the Park is now in a poor and neglected condition. The original members of the Pocket Park Association – now only 3 in number - have become older and cannot manage some of the physical work involved.

The Parish Council, supported by the Pulborough Society and the Pulborough Partnership, are now launching an initiative to revive the Pocket Park Association and general interest in Pocket Park. St Mary's School are also keen to become involved. (The Park has much educational potential in natural history, ecology etc.). The Association needs **VOLUNTEERS!**

Volunteers can help in two ways: firstly, they can join the Pocket Park Association, and under the guidance of John Garrett (one of the founder members) meet reasonably regularly once a month or when need demands) to do physical work in the Park, e.g. clearance of scrub, removal of litter and debris etc, to improve its appearance, and secondly to join in what we hope will be a large group on a particular Sunday in March or April (the date will be announced in the next Parish newsletter) when we will tackle a particular project in the Park where the more hands that are put to work, the greater the effect of the work will be.

If you are at all interested in helping, particularly by joining a small group on a regular basis, please contact John Garrett (**01798 873207**), John Denison (**01798 872613**) or Phil Williams (**01798 875025**). You would be very welcome, and obviously the work you do will be very much to the benefit of the village. However, if you would like to help but feel you cannot manage a regular commitment, watch this space in the next Newsletter for the date to be announced for a 'big bash' day in spring next year and come along then!

HEDGES

Please make sure that your hedges, shrubs and trees are not obstructing the footpath outside your property. It is essential that they are cut back to allow pedestrians to walk or use buggies on the pavements without obstruction. This is also important to motorists whose visibility at busy junctions can be obstructed by overgrown hedges. There seems to be a particular problem this year with pedestrians and even motorists having to swerve to avoid overhanging branches and foliage in several parts of Pulborough. Please check hedges and trees are not causing problems.

ADOPT A FOOTPATH

The Parish Council is keen to encourage residents to Adopt A Footpath. If you regularly use one of the many public footpaths in Pulborough, then why not adopt it? The scheme would involve keeping a regular eye on the footpath and reporting to the Parish Council should anything be amiss. Your involvement could be limited to monitoring of the footpath or you could assist maintenance of the footpath with occasional pruning of any overgrown foliage. SAFER BRIDLEWAYS

Bridleways and footpaths are part of the heritage of the countryside. They give everyone a way to enjoy the countryside safely away from road traffic. The local riding club were asking for help on bridleway issues. I offered, as I had been involved with bridleways in Bucks working with various layers of Council authorities and the British Horse Society.

Access has to be made as safe as possible for all of us. West Sussex County Council and our own Parish Council should make sure that these rights of way are not allowed to disappear. WSCC Rangers check footpaths and bridleways on a nine monthly rota for routine maintenance. Local riders have helped me by checking routes for correct height and width. Surface problems do not appear to be routine maintenance. I am pleased to see some results from the last report but there are many more still to be resolved.

There are changes on the Way. Access Forums sponsored by WSCC are working on a Rights of Way Improvement Plan. Again, thanks to local riders, a plan for this area has been put to the Low Weald Access Forum. It concentrates on safe, off-road, multi-user, circular routes connecting villages to villages. If anyone wants to help, or is already working on rights of way, or just wants to report a problem, please contact me through the Parish Council Office. **Carol Houston**

Environment Focus Group Update

The Environment Focus team of ten people has been busy with projects identified in the Action Plan. These include:

Village Design Statement: This is guidance to planners on how the people of Pulborough want the area to look and feel. The document will define the criteria which Horsham District Council will adopt to judge future developments. This will involve public consultation early in the New Year.

Village History and life: this is a resource for teachers to enable them to take pupils around the village with a set of child orientated questions, related pictures and answers; they are published on CD and can be available to anyone else who is interested – contact Rob Aylott on 01798 872823

Swan Bridge area restoration

Improvements on the south side are continuing with tree planting and further post and rail fencing. On the North side additional bollards to restrict illegal parking and sympathetic cladding of the pumping station has been done. Further work is now dependent on the survey of the bridge.

Planned projects for 2005

Subject to grants being forthcoming and volunteers being available we have planned the following projects for 2005. Four walks round the area, the Moat area restoration and Pocket Park maintenance.

What's New in Pulborough?

Tesco's Gets the Go Ahead

The planning application for the proposed Tesco foodstore with car parking and access was formally approved by Horsham District Council on 6 October. Outline planning permission was also granted for the proposed primary care centre, 60 bed nursing home, 30 retirement flats, 16 houses and 11 flats.

Plans submitted for Riverside Concrete

Rydon Homes has submitted a planning application for 150 units at the old Riverside Concrete site. The proposed development is for 17 four-bedroom houses and a mixed development of 1, 2 and 3 bedroom flats and houses. It is expected that 30 units will be available for social housing.

The Parish Council indicated its support in principle for the proposed development in our response to the Local Development Framework, subject to the detailed design and provided there was no vehicular

access by the railway bridge. The application provides for vehicular access via a roundabout between Downsview and Stane Street Close. Only pedestrians, cyclists and emergency vehicles will have access by the railway bridge.

Film Evenings in Pulborough

Macmillan Cancer Relief are continuing with the film evenings at the Village Hall (Pulborough Social Centre) They will be using Cinemobile to project 35 mm film and will show currently released films. Wine, ice creams, tea and coffee will be served during the interval and there will also be a raffle to raise funds for the Macmillan Unit and Midhurst. The Winter dates are:

New Developments In Community Link

Horsham District Council's Community Link Alarm System currently has over 1200 clients. As with all products that feature electronic equipment the service is always under review to keep abreast of all innovations and improvements in the products themselves, so that clients can be sure of the best service.

The Community Link Alarm System has been available to people in Horsham District for over 17 years year has seen enormous advances in "smart technology" that can be operated from the normal community link alarm system. All the smart sensors can be programmed into the alarm and they do not have to be hard wired. These sensors include flood, CO2 and carbon monoxide detectors, extreme temperature monitors, passive infrared detectors and wandering client alerts etc. The object of this smart technology is to assist with early discharge from hospital and help to protect people's property.
