Recommendations for Changes to Council Meeting and Committee Meetings

1. Meeting Start Time and Day

- o Proposed Change: Adjust the start time of all meetings to 6:00 PM on a Monday.
- Justification: I understand that many of you face challenges attending meetings on Thursday evenings due to other commitments. Shifting the meetings to Monday at 6:00 PM appears to be the most suitable option for everyone. This earlier start time is more accommodating for both staff and attendees, enabling meetings to conclude at a more reasonable hour and ensuring a smoother, more efficient schedule.

2. Meeting Location

- Proposed Change: Investigate using the United Reformed Church (URC) Hall as the primary meeting venue.
- Justification: This location addresses sound quality concerns raised by Councillors, there is no availability on the selected days at the village hall and reduces costs by £20 per session.

3. Full Council Meetings

- Proposed Change: Transition to bi-monthly meetings, starting at 6:00 PM on Monday evenings.
- Justification: This schedule helps alleviate stress for both Councillors and staff while fostering more meaningful discussions. The flexibility to call extraordinary meetings will ensure that any urgent matters can still be addressed promptly.

4. Recreation & Open Spaces Committee

- o **Proposed Change:** Transition to quarterly meetings.
- Justification: A review of recent minutes shows a lack of substantive discussions and a quarterly schedule would enable more comprehensive and impactful deliberations.

5. Planning & Services Committee

- Proposed Change: Proposed Change: Move to a three-weekly schedule on Monday evenings, eliminating short planning meetings but increasing the regularity of meetings.
- Justification: The 21-day timeframe is the minimum amount of notice HDC are allowed to give us for comment, 30 days being the standard. The only point when 14 days are issued are for application such as LDC's which Pulborough Parish Council do not comment on. Horsham District Council has confirmed that this approach is more effective and beneficial.

6. Finance & Policy Committee

- Proposed Change: Meetings will be scheduled as attached, in consultation with the Clerk and Chair of Finance.
- Justification: Aligns with other nearby Councils' practices while ensuring meetings are held to update the Council regularly.

Silver Bullet Men's Social Group - Tuesday 5th November

The first meeting of the Age UK Silver Bullet Group was held at Macklin's @ The Riverside on Tuesday 5th November. There was a really good number of men in attendance and the group was also visited by PMG Social Prescriber Freddie Jones. Our thanks go to Freddie for helping us to promote the group and Macklin's for supporting the group by allowing use of their venue.





The group meets at Macklin's on the 1st Tuesday of each month between 2pm & 4pm and is run by Age UK volunteer Andy.

Horsham District Older Peoples Forum Meeting – Wednesday 6th November

Louisa joined the meeting via Teams call to update the group on the warden teams activities and events for older people and about what was going on in Pulborough for older people. There were also lots of updates from other agencies and organisations such as: Community Transport Sussex, Olive Tree Cancer Support, NHS Living Well Team, Blind Veterans UK, Royal Voluntary Service (RVS), Royal National Institute for Deaf People (RNID) and HDC's Health & Wellbeing Team.

Visits to Older & Vulnerable Residents

This month we have spent a lot of time supporting residents with issues ranging from mobile/home phones and Broadband contracts to central heating issues. A considerable amount of our time is spent helping members of the community with matters that there is no other immediate source of help for, be that none or distant family members and cuts in provision elsewhere.

Youth

School visits to St Mary's Primary

We continue to join in with the pupils lunchtime play session one day a week (diary permitting) which is a wonderful opportunity to engage with the young people, getting to know them and for them to get to know us.

We offered to help with the Yr 5/6 walk to church on Friday 15th. This involved assisting with marshaling the young people safely there and back, whilst forming a temporary road closure at the top of Church Hill to allow them cross safely.



Weekly Multi Sports for Autistic & SEN Children



Our weekly multi sports sessions for Autistic and SEN children and their siblings has continued to be well attended. Louisa has been attending fortnightly, working alongside Storrington & Sullington Wardens Chris Poore and John Sampson.







During one of the November sessions, we were lucky to be joined by one of Brighton & Hove Albion's football coaches who taught some of the children ball skills which they enjoyed immensely.

Modern Board Games Club

Continuing from our report last month, as a joint project with our colleagues in Storrington, we are starting a Dungeons and Dragons/Modern Board Games Club next year and sessions will start on the Saturday 25th January 4:30-6:30 pm. The club is aimed at young people aged 11+

We will initially be running the club in Storrington but will set up a Pulborough session too if there is enough demand...









We were alerted to a fire in Pocket Park that took place over the weekend of the 16/17th November. It appeared that an accelerant may have been used and ask that people do not light fires in this area as it is both extremely dangerous and an important habitat for wildlife which is currently undergoing an extensive improvement programme through the Parish Council.


Warden Monthly Report

Quarterly Warden Team Meeting – Tuesday 3rd December

We attended our quarterly team meeting at Parkside on the 3rd December. This was also our warden Christmas get together so many of the team were wearing their Christmas jumpers. Ross was very happy to win a box of mince pies for the naffest Christmas jumper! (It's true, it was absolutely horrendous – Ross)

During the meeting we had an interesting update from our colleague Phil Mockett from the Community Link Team. Not only does the team provide Assistive Technology such as Digital Lifeline Alarms, GPS Mobile & Locator Devices and Fall Detectors but they also have a Virtual Reality (VR) headset service which can for a small fee be used by community groups or those who are confined to their own home. Whilst wearing the headset users can view 360-degree footage of locations based around nature, beach locations, scenery, and some city locations around the world. These videos are either set to music or relaxing nature sounds.

Community Link also have a "RoboCat" which is a form of robotic pet and can be seen in the picture below. Robotic cats can be a good alternative to real pets for people with dementia because they can: Provide companionship and comfort, help alleviate feelings of loneliness and isolation, be a calming influence, be interactive and responsive to touch, sound, and motion, and do not require feeding or cleaning.



We have spoken with the Anchorage Care Home and are planning a visit by Phil with Robocat and the VR headset in the new year.

Pulborough Parish Council Christmas Market – Friday 6th December

This individual needed a lot of support, requiring multiple house visits and conversations with supporting services during this time, as we were concerned that there may not be sufficient support in place when services reduced over the festive period. We continue to provide ongoing support to this individual.

We have visited the school during lunchtime play as usual and had much fun with the young people, plus we helped some enterprising pupils setup their 'Crazy Creations' homemade crafts stall for their after-school sale. This incredibly kind-hearted and school-community minded group of Yr 6s have spent the last few months making and baking and got together to sell their wares in the playground after school, to raise funds for the annual Big Top production. Together and with the help of a playground full of hungry pupils, the team managed to raise well in excess of £100 for the school!

ASB

Thankfully a resident spotted the behaviour and moved the bench back to safety away from the river.

We were also alerted to some storm damaged trees by the bowling club that were blocking a footpath and leaning against a telegraph pole. The tree blocking the footpath was being dealt with by a member of the community with his trusty saw and wheelbarrow, whilst the other required more specialist works and was referred to the Parish Council for their attention.





Rest Centre Pack Familiarisation Training – Thursday 5th December

We attended a training session with Horsham District Council's Emergency Planning Officer Tony Skelding to talk through the contents of the Rest Centre Pack held at the Village Hall. The hall is on the HDC list to be a Rest Centre should there be any form of emergency in the parish where residents need to be moved from their homes to a place of safety. As wardens, we are Rest Centre Manager trained along with other members of HDC staff.
